

Switched on to green

PROVIDING a green Australia for future generations has turned into a golden career move for Michelle Morton.

In February, the Henley Beach resident (pictured) opened her own business called E-Cycle Recovery.

For a fee, the company takes electronic goods, that would otherwise go to the dump, from the public and recycles them at its Richmond site.

The business, which

relies on people wanting to pay to make sure their goods are recycled, is going well.

"I've worked at (a) recycling centre in Glen Osmond since 2004 and am still there now," she said.

"But while working there I realised there was no one providing a recycling service for electronics in SA."

Since opening in February, the company has pulled apart and recycled more than 20

tonnes of electronic waste.

"Electronic goods are on the increase. People are having more and more of them and more of it needs to be taken care of in a friendly way," she said. "But it is also good for Australia and I feel happy knowing we are doing something for the future."
